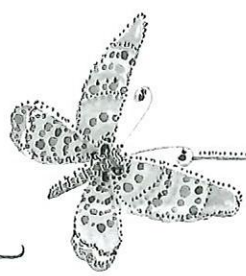
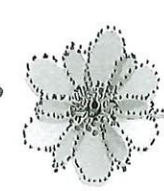

Lane Reconfigurations on Route 32 at Old Norwich Road and SR 693 Town of Waterford

PROJECT LOCATION

This project is located on Route 32 (Mohegan Avenue) and SR 693 (Montville Connector) at the intersection of Old Norwich Road in the Town of Waterford. The project limits extend from approximately MP 3.86 to MP 4.15 along Route 32 (Mohegan Avenue) and MP 0.00 to MP 0.27 along SR 693 (Montville Connector).

EXISTING CONDITIONS

Route 32 and SR 693 are classified as Urban Principal Arterials and have posted speed limits of 45 and 50 MPH respectively in the proposed project area. Route 32 and SR 693 run in a north/south direction and have an average daily traffic of approximately 4,700 and 16,200 vehicles (2023) respectively. At the intersection of Old Norwich Road and Route 32 (intersection 152-236), Route 32 Northbound consists of a 2-foot- wide left shoulder, 12-foot-wide left turning lane, 2 11-foot-wide thru lanes and a 10-foot-wide right shoulder. Route 32 Southbound consists of a 2-foot-wide left shoulder, 12-foot-wide left dedicated turning lane, 2 11-foot-wide thru lanes, 12-foot-wide right turning lane and a 10-foot-wide right shoulder. The portion of Old Norwich Road that intersects Route 32 to the west of intersection 152-236 consists of one approximately 17-foot-wide lane in the eastbound direction and one approximately 19-foot-wide lane in the westbound direction. The multi-residential driveway located at eastern leg of intersection 152-236 consists of a 17.5-foot-wide gravel driveway. Route 32 has multiple driveway aprons for residential houses. SR 693 connects Route 32 to Interstate-395. A dedicated 12-foot-wide left turning lane provides access from Route 32 Southbound onto Hempstead Drive.

A preliminary traffic analysis performed by the Department's Project Development Unit showed existing queues of approximately 2,400 feet in 2022 in Route 32's right most northbound travel lane during the PM Peak Hour. This queue length was then field verified. It was predicted that with the current roadway configuration, the queue length would increase to 3,500 feet by 2042.

Over the course of a 3-year period, between June 26, 2020, and June 26, 2023, there were 77 crashes and 24 injuries within the project limits. The right most lane on Route 32 Northbound experienced a high number of rear end crashes (44 crashes and 13 injuries) which are likely related to the large traffic backups.

Within the project limits there are two main drainage crossings consisting of twin 42-inch reinforced concrete pipes (R.C.P) that carry stormwater under Route 32. The first crossing inlets near Burlake Road, carries water to the east underneath Route 32 and the SR 693 on-ramp. It outlets into a paved swale northeast of the intersection 152-236. The second crossing's inlet is located on the eastern side of Route 32 just south of intersection 152-236. This crossing runs southwest underneath Route 32 and outlets to the west of Route 32, south of intersection 152-236. These drainage crossings are connected to existing paved channels that run adjacent to Route 32. The headwall located by Burlake Road at the inlet to the twin 42-inch R.C.P shows significant deterioration along its face. In addition, this system has sediment built up within the channels.

PROJECT PURPOSE

The purpose of the project is to reduce congestion and congestion related crashes at the signalized intersection of Route 32, SR 693, and Old Norwich Road.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project proposes to add a dedicated right turning lane from Route 32 Northbound to the Montville Connector by shifting all existing lanes to the west approximately 5 feet. The existing right-most travel lane on Route 32 Northbound will be converted to a combination thru and right turning lane. In addition, the entrance to the Montville Connector will be reconfigured to include 2 auxiliary lanes instead of 1 to accommodate the dual right turn lanes being installed on Route 32 Northbound. The 5-foot lane shift on Route 32 will require the installation of new concrete median barrier, catch basins along the median, median impact attenuators, and full depth reconstruction of an area approximately 10 feet wide along the center of Route 32 to replace the concrete center

barrier. The portion of Old Norwich Road that intersects Route 32 will be widened towards the south to accommodate a dedicated north turning lane and a combined north and south turning lane. The pavement on both sides of Route 32 within the project limits will be milled and overlaid.

A new traffic signal system will be installed for intersection 152-236. The traffic signal phasing/signal timing will be modified to reflect the proposed lane reconfigurations. According to a preliminary traffic analysis performed by the Department's Project Development Unit, the proposed improvements to Route 32 Northbound are projected to reduce queue lengths to less than 300 feet in 2042.

This project proposes to remove the sediment buildup within the channels, and replace the existing headwall located in the vicinity of Burlake Road along with other minor drainage modifications. The guiderail along the entire project limits will be replaced with guiderail that meets current Department standards.

RIGHTS OF WAY

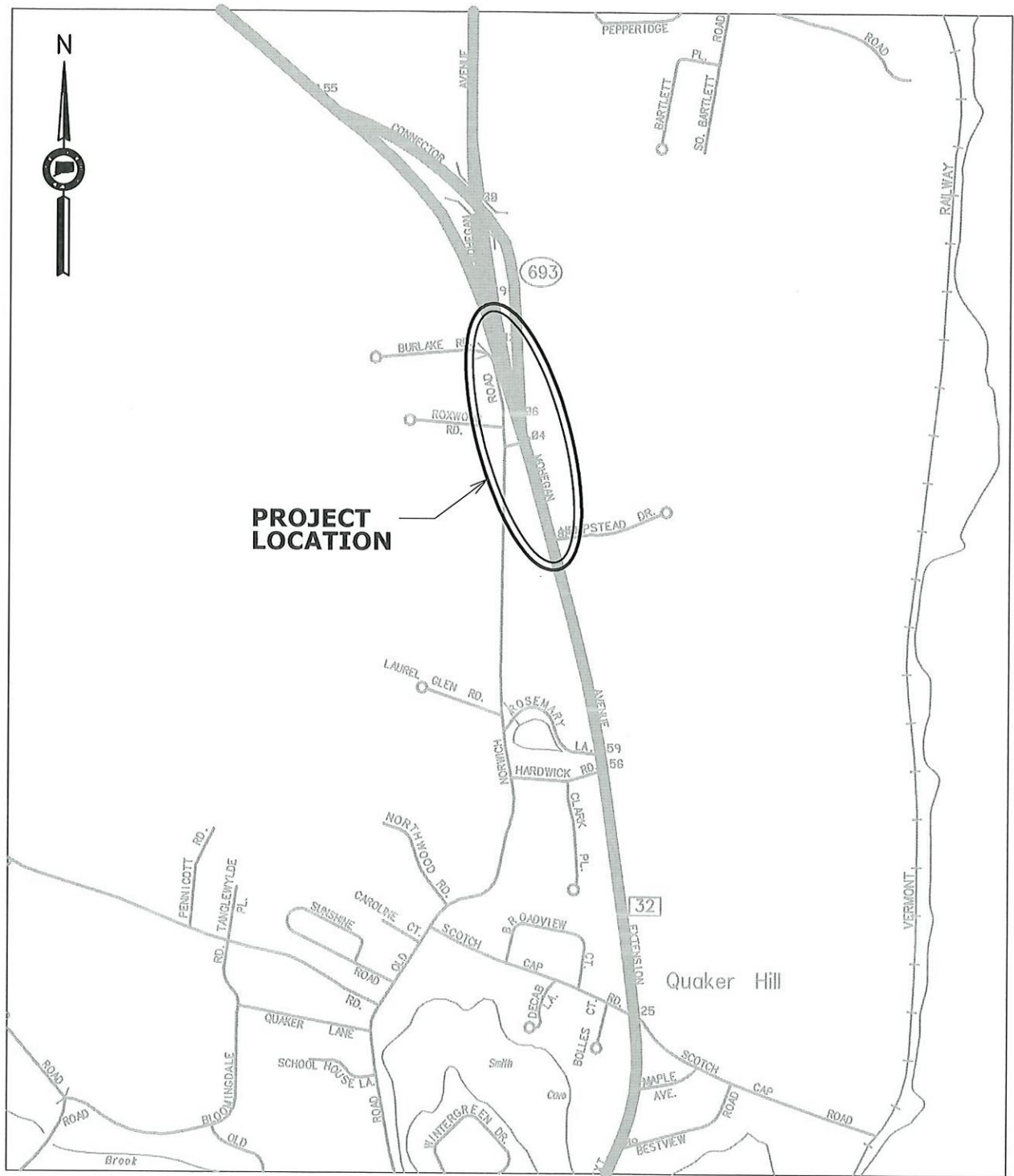
It is anticipated that most of the proposed improvements will be completed within the State Right of Way, however the extent of any impacts will be determined as the project progresses.

LINE OF SIGHT ISSUES:

- No new reports

DOT RELATED ISSUES.

- DOT project 0152-0163 Proposed change to Route 32 at the Montville Connector, adding right turn lane and new traffic light system to accommodate the changes to the roadway. DOT has suggested "No Pedestrian Crossing" signs be added to the roadway, and are looking for the towns input.
- DOT has changed the speed limit on Rope Ferry Road from Boston Post to North Road.
- Complaint of traffic light from Fog Plain Rd to Route 1 not cycling for Fog Plain Rd traffic. Observed for several cycles and tested pulling up to the light multiple times and follow up. No issues observed. Additional calls in December with no timing issues observed.

PARKING COMPLAINTS:

- No new parking complaints at this time.

ENFORCEMENT RELATED COMPLAINTS:

- No new complaints at this time.

REQUESTS FOR SIGNS OR CHANGE OF ROADWAY FEATURES:

- None at this time.

SPEED TRAFFIC SIGN DEPLOYMENT:

The two solar powered speed signs have remained in place at the below listed locations.

1. Niantic River Rd. in the area of Old Niantic River Rd, facing southbound traffic. The data shows that vehicle traffic during the month of December 2024 was at or below the speed limit approximately 12% of the time. Approximately 70% of the vehicles were traveling between 31 to 40 mph. Approximately 16% of vehicles were traveling between 41-45 mph. Approximately 2% were traveling between 46-50 mph and less than 1% were traveling greater than 51 mph.
2. Great Neck Road near Goshen Rd, in front of Great Neck School. The data shows that vehicle traffic during the month of December 2024 was at or below the speed limit approximately 33% of the time. Approximately 55% of the vehicles were traveling between 26 to 35. Vehicles were traveling between 36-45 mph approximately 12% of the time. Approximately .001% were traveling at a speed of 46 mph or greater, a total of 33 vehicles during the month of December.

1. Fog Plain Road in the area of Devonshire Drive, facing westbound traffic. The data shows vehicle traffic from December 24, 2024 to December 31, 2024 was at or below the posted speed limit of 25 mph, 32% of the time. Vehicles were traveling between 26-35 mph approximately 55% of the time and 36-45 mph approximately 12% of the time. Approximately 1% of vehicles were traveling 46 mph or above during this time period.
2. Miner Lane entrance to Waterford High School had a speed feedback radar sign in place during part of November and December. Traffic was below 25 mph 86% of the time. Approximately 11% of the time vehicles were between 26-30 mph and 3% of the time they exceeded 31mph. This information was shared with SRO Malbourn.

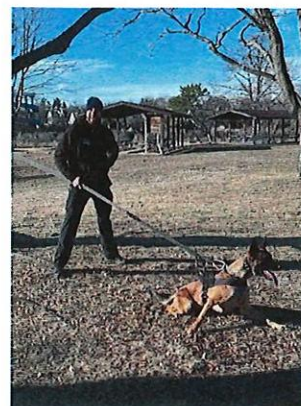

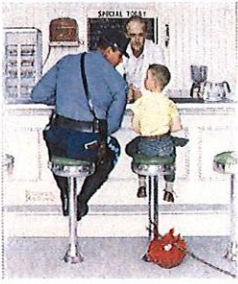

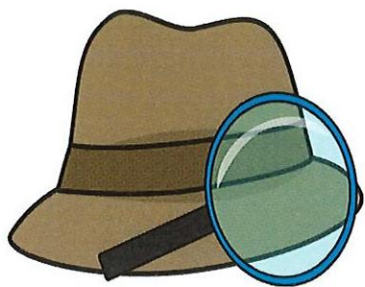

December 2024 Updates:

Investigative Services completed numerous undercover retail assignments in the month of December with the holiday month resulting in more shoppers. Investigative Services collaborated with the Connecticut State Police Retail Theft Task Force resulting in a high dollar arrest from Target of Kitchen Aide mixers.. After the suspect vehicle attempted to elude police it was later located in the Lawrence and Memorial Hospital parking lot occupied with the stolen items inside. An arrest of two males was made on scene.

Detective Bonkowski completed her first of two semesters at The University of Rhode Island: Scientific Evidence 1 program passing all classes. She will start up again for the spring semester at the end of January.

Detective Carroll and Lieutenant VanOverloop were interviewed by the national pod cast "The Deck" in the hopes of bringing more leads to follow in the murder investigation of Kyle Seidel. This podcast episode is reportedly scheduled to be released at the end of the winter.

Sergeant Avdevich attended a Critical Incident Management training hosted by Bowmac at the Law Enforcement Council in Norwich, CT. This was a three (3) day training.

December 2024 Investigations:

Detective O'Connell and Detective Carroll were assigned two (2) dispatcher background investigations. One of the investigations has been completed while the other will be concluded soon.

Investigator Zaldivar continues to assist patrol on two (2) larcenies from Eversource utility trucks that occurred during the overnight hours on separate dates. A suspect has been identified and the case will be under further investigation

After patrol received a call of an elderly woman located on the ground of her residence for an extended period of time with injury and not able to effectively communicate the Investigative Services Division assisted. It was determined after some length of time that the incident was not suspicious in nature and that the woman had fallen accidentally and was then unable to get herself up resulting in a prolonged situation of being incapacitated.

Detective Bonkowski responded to an untimely death of a forty four (44) year old male on Scotch Cap Road. The death appears to be drug related and non suspicious. The case will be ongoing.

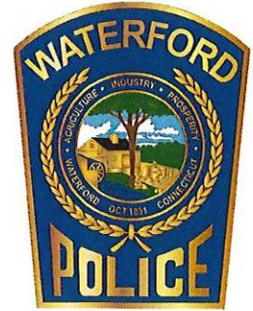

TRAINING REPORT DECEMBER 2024



Officer Luce attended a week long Crisis Intervention Training. This training brings community and law enforcement resources together to address common issues related to mental health and how law enforcement interacts with people that have mental health issues

Officer Ewing, Officer Donovan, and Officer Robinson attended a three-day Field training Officer Training. This in depth class taught officers the Field Training Officer's role in assisting probationary officers in certifying for solo patrol operations by applying the knowledge and skills acquired during basic police training and using them according to our agencies policy, procedures, and community service delivery standards and the POST Field Training and Evaluation Program. Some of the topics covered are remedial training, phase training evaluation, liability, effective teaching skills, and standard evaluation guidelines just to name a few.

Sergeant Avdevich attended a three-day Critical Incident Initial Response and Management Simulation Based Training hosted by the Law Enforcement Council. This training guided officers through every aspect of a critical incident. Some of these topics included taking command at a scene, managing the response and resources, to the resolution, and the recovery and mitigation from the incident.

Sergeant Caler and Officer Bushwack attended a three-day Use of Force Summit at the Mohegan Sun Casino put on by the Daigle Law Group. The Use of Force Summit provided attendees with presentations from top industry expert instructors, live keynote presentations and panels from experts across the country regarding the hottest use of force topics in our country.

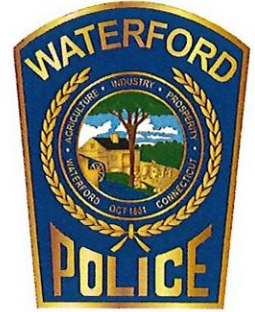
Officer Rodriguez attended a week long recertification training hosted by the Law Enforcement Council. This is a requirement in order for officers to receive their police recertification every three years.

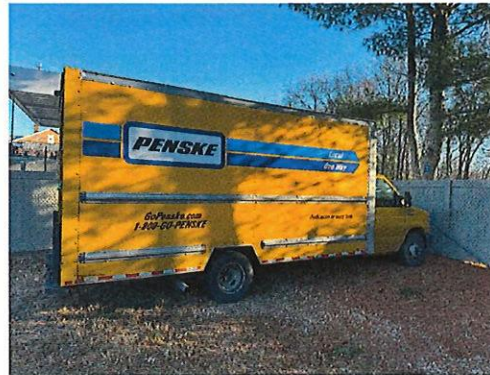

**Wal-Mart: Theft of Legos**

On December 1, 2024 Wal-Mart loss prevention advised a two females had just stolen approximately \$1,111.96 worth of Legos. It was reported that they fled in a silver Nissan Cube. Off. **Stop and Shop Larceny: Leads to Drug Arrest and Use of Force**

On 12/28/24 Officers assigned to day shift were conducting proactive patrol checks of Home Depot. At this time officers observed a male that was known to them from numerous previous police contacts enter the store. The suspect left a short time later carrying numerous items inside of a Wal-Mart bag. Contact was attempted to be made on RTE 85 and the subject fled onto the I-95 South off ramp. While checking Harvey Avenue Off. Surdo located the fleeing suspect who was found to be in possession of numerous stolen power tools. The fleeing suspect was arrested and charged with Larceny 6th Degree and Interfering w/ an Officer. The merchandise was seized, photographed, and returned to Home Depot.

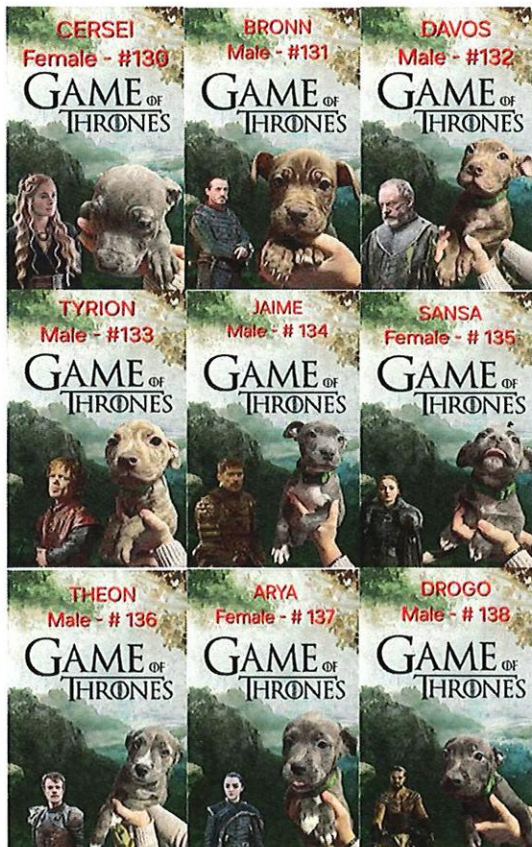
